| Campfield,<br>Kincardine      | —    | He is said 'to have belonged to the artillery company at Woolwich.' He said he was forced out by Glenbucket. He commanded the Carlisle Castle artillery. He fired the first cannon at the English army from Carlisle. He was taken prisoner at Carlisle on the surrender of the town, December 1745. He was sent to London, tried and convicted, but reprieved. Judge Burnett wrote to the Duke of Newcastle in his favour on 1st June 1747. He was pardoned in July 1748 and banished on condition of his not returning to the country.— <i>Macbeth Forbes</i> , p. 8; <i>S.P.D.</i> , 107-81, 79-26, 98-5, 107-75; <i>P.S. | Ballindarg                    | 28   | Miller. Sentenced to death.— <i>S.P.D.</i> , 88-124; <i>P.R.</i> , 3621-3.  |

| York                          | —    | An enthusiastic Jacobite, he was made prisoner on suspicion of having crossed England with the intention of kissing the Prince's hand. On arriving in London he was sent to a messenger's house and remained in his custody until 25.3.47, when he was released. The Attorney-General had reported on 15th July 1746 that there was not enough evidence to prosecute him.— <i>Lyon</i> , i. 143, 281; <i>S.P.D.</i> , 99-15.  |
